President's Message

We took four days to get there and on the way ran into rain every day, including some big downpours and thunder. We did take time to stop at Independence Rock on the way. They would take time to have a 4th of July celebration and carve their names on the rock formation. There are approximately 5,000 names on Independence Rock. This was our 2nd convention to attend but my first as a national officer. It was great to finally meet the other national officers in person and to meet the FMCA staff who work tirelessly to keep the FMCA wheels rolling. I have talked with them on the phone and through e-mails, but to finally meet them in per-

son was a real treat. When I read through the Staff Guidebook I was given, I was amazed at all the work assignments the staff must do to ensure the convention goes off without a problem. Of course, being a national officer meant I had lots to attend to also. I was assigned (voluntold?) gate guard duty on two days. This meant making sure RVs did not come in the wrong gates but rather to direct them to the proper entry gate. We had an Executive Board meeting prior to the convention start, as there were a couple of unfinished items to address before the Governing Board meeting during the convention. I had our Area Caucus, where I met with our Western Area delegates to go over the Governing Board meeting agenda. I also, along with Jon Walker, presented a 30year Anniversary Certificate to the Sierra Hi-Rollers. I attended First Timer Mentor training, First Timers Meeting and President's Forum. For the Ladies Luncheon I helped serve the lunch. This was fun and us servers got to eat once all the ladies were served. It was a rather good lunch to boot, with plenty of food for all. Moving on, we had the Annual Meeting then a farewell luncheon for the outgoing officers. After that, we had a meeting of the new Executive Board. Between all this Debbie and I managed to see all the vendors, spend some money and to walk through some new coaches. This was a great convention and if you have not been to one yet, you need to add one to your "things to do" list.

With the convention behind us, it was time to see more of our great country. We headed up to Montana and stopped for a couple of nights so we could go out to the Little Bighorn Battlefield. Using I-90 it was a beautiful drive, except smoke from all the fires out west was obscur-

ing a lot of the scenery. Our next stop was Hamilton, Montana, located in the Bitterroot Valley, to see a friend of Debbie's. This was her manicurist for 30 years who recently moved up here. The object of the Frustrated Maestros is to allow members to show their talents and bring out of hiding their tried and true memories. The good old songs of yesterday. It's a chance to dust off those dancing

shoes, or sit and hum a long-forgotten tune. We don our "red-whites" and take to the stage along with some odd and rare types of instruments, such as kazoos, washboards, tambourines and we even had a toilet seat (now retired)! Yes indeed, we do have members who play the real thing too: tuba, trumpet, saxophone, drums, trombone, and many others. May I add that we do have some terrific talent among us! When the Frustrated Maestros get together, it is a real family reunion. We enjoy one another's company

Dues are only \$10 per year. The friendships we've made over the years make it all so wonderful. It's so great being a Frustrated Maestro.

Editor's Corner

Yahoo, Barbecue!

Do you Barbecue, Barbeque, BBQ or Grill? There is a major difference between barbecuing and grilling, but many people are unaware, so they use both terms loosely.

Barbecuing is the world's oldest cooking method. The definition of barbecuing is "low-and-slow" smoking and cooking over indirect heat. The results achieved from barbecuing using smoke, indirect heat, spices, rubs, and the natural juices of meats are beyond dispute. I say that grilling hamburgers, hot dogs, steaks, or chicken over direct heat using hot charcoals or a gas grill and calling it BBQ is just plain wrong. Not that there's anything wrong with grilling!

Don't get me wrong, you can barbecue great food and meals over charcoal and/or propane using indirect heat. Over the years, I have found that wood pellet smoker-grills are perfect units for barbecuing. Many of the units are capable of indirect and direct cooking configurations. Their digital controls range from 150°F to over 500°F.

Various manufacturers build portable wood pellet smoker-grills capable of being carried in your RV. Many of these portable units



sport WiFi digital controllers and run on 12 VDC and/or 120 VAC. Anyone is capable of cooking delicious meals using a wood pellet smoker-grill at home or on the road. I have spent years, since 2011, developing easy recipes which can be found on my Blog and/or in my wood pellet smoker & grill cookbook. So the next time you smell Hickory, follow that aroma

to see what's smoking/cooking. Don't be surprised to see how many RVers are carrying a wood pellet smoker & grill.

I smoked/cooked all these delicious recipes using a portable wood pellet smoker & grill. But, you can use any type of pit as long as you're able to maintain indirect cooking temperatures. Bon Appétit

Seasoning recommendations: Rub your meat & poultry with roasted garlic extra virgin olive oil, your favorite seasoning, wrap in plastic, and refrigerate prior to cooking. I use this method for most recipes.

Always cook the meat to internal temperatures taken at the thickest part using a digital instant-read thermometer. Times given are for planning purposes only. Don't forget to include preheat and resting times. Very important to rest the meat & poultry loosely under a foil tent before serving. Always slice against the grain.



Smoked Tri-Tip Roast

Trim excess fat and silver skin on the Tri-Tip Roast. Season and refrigerate overnight. Configure your pit for indirect cooking and preheat to 235°F using Hickory wood pellets. Smoke the Tri-Tip for about 2 hrs until the internal temp reaches 145°F (medium rare). Rest the roast for 10 minutes.



<u>Smoked Pork Spare Ribs</u>
Traditionally smoked with Hickory but I prefer to use a mix of Hickory, Cherry, Apple, and Maple. Season your ribs and fridge overnight. Smoke the ribs for 1 hr at 180°F. Bump the pit temp to 250°F for an additional 4+ hours until internal temp reaches 190°F to 200°F. Rest for 10 minutes.



Smoked Half Chicken

Season the half chicken and fridge for 4 hrs. Smoke the chicken using Hickory for 1 hr at 225°F. Bump the pit temp to 375°F till internal temp at the thickest part of the breast reaches 170°F and the skin is crisp. Rest the smoked chicken for 10 minutes.



Smoked Meatloaf

Use your favorite meatloaf recipe. Smoke the meatloaf at 180°F for an hour using your favorite wood pellets before increasing the pit temp to 350°F. Pull the smoked meatloaf when the internal temp reaches 160°F. Rest the meatloaf for 10 minutes.



Smoked Pulled Pork Butt

The days of smoking a pork butt for 14 to 18 hours are a thing of the past. With this recipe, you can cut the time down to 8 hrs. I am not an advocate of leaving the fat cap on because it hinders the formation of that delectable flavored bark. Smoke your seasoned pork butt at 225°F for 3 hrs before bump-

ing the pit temp to 375°F. Cook the pork butt until you reach an internal temp of 160°F. Double wrap the pork butt in heavy duty foil and return to the pit. Cook until you reach an internal temp of 200°F. Wrap the pork butt in a towel and place it in a cooler (Foil, Towel, Cooler [FTC]) for 3 hrs before pulling the pork butt. Caution, the pork butt will be extremely hot.

These recipes sound and look extremely easy. That's because they are! No need for those fancy schmancy foo-foo recipes. Keep it simple.



Smoked Bone-In Turkey Breast

Season a 10 lb turkey breast and fridge for 4 hrs. Smoke the breast with Hickory or Cherry for 2 hrs at 200°F. Raise the pit temp to 325°F and finish cooking the turkey breast for about 2 hrs until the internal temperature at the thickest part reaches 170°F. Rest the smoked bone-in turkey breast for 20 minutes.



Smoked Pork Tenderloins

Pork no longer must be taken to 160°F. New USDA guidelines allows pork to be cooked to 145°F which produce very moist, tender and slightly pink results. Refrigerate the seasoned tenderloins for 4 hrs. Use Apple or Hickory to smoke the tenderloins at 225°F for approximately 2 hrs until the internal temp

reaches 145°F. Rest the smoked pork tenderloins for 10 minutes.



Smoked New York Strip Roast

Season a New York Strip Roast and refrigerate overnight. Smoke the roast at 240°F for approximately 2 hrs until the internal temperature reaches 135°F for medium rare. Rest the smoked New York Strip Roast for 10 minutes.



Smoked Sirloin Pork Roast

A Sirloin Pork Roast comes from the whole boneless pork loin. Always trim off the fat cap and silver skin before seasoning the roast. Refrigerate overnight. Smoke a 21/2 lb sirloin pork roast using Apple or Hickory pellets at 180°F for an hour. Bump the pit temperature to 350°F and cook until the internal

temp reaches 145°F. Rest the smoked sirloin pork roast for 10 minutes.

Smoke rings do not alter the taste of your food but they give the food a dramatic look and smoking with wood is the only way to achieve them.
