#### **RVERS GOOD NEIGHBOR POLICY**

#### **Overnight Parking Etiquette**

The Good Neighbor Policy was created in the early 90s by Escapees RV Club. Since then, it has become the **Industry-sanctioned Code of Conduct** for overnight parking. I hope that the Good Neighbor Policy serves as a reminder that RVers must be respectful of the communities they visit.

- Stay one night only!
- Obtain permission from a qualified individual
- Obey posted regulations
- No awnings, chairs or barbecue grills
- Do not use hydraulic jacks on soft surfaces (Including asphalt)
- Always leave an area cleaner than you found it
- Purchase gas, food or supplies as a form of thank you, when feasible
- Be safe! Always be aware of your surroundings and leave if you feel unsafe

If your plans include touring the area, staying for more than one night, or necessitate conduct not within the code, please relocate to a local campground. It's the right thing to do!

Not following the code has serious consequences and is detrimental to the rights of all RVers. Already, some municipalities have passed ordinances to prohibit parking on private business property overnight.

Please do not take offense to the RVers Good Neighbor Policy; it is only provided as a reminder that RVers must be perceived as good neighbors or there will be more pressure to institute state, county and local ordinances to prohibit parking on private business property.

Preserve the privilege of overnight parking. Follow the code and encourage others to follow it, too!

#### **Editor's Corner**

# I say "am-end" and you say "almond"

Farmers will often tell you, you call it an almond on the tree and an am-end on the ground because you shake the "L" out of it when the nuts are harvested. When almonds are ready to be harvested, a shaking machine enters the field. Shaking machines are used on each individual tree in order to shake the nuts off the tree. The shaking machines have guards on their grips, so that they do not cause any damage to the trees.



Although almonds are not native to California, a hot, dry Mediterranean climate and developed water infrastructure create ideal conditions for commercial cultivation of the crop. The state produces 80% of the world's almonds and 100% of the United States' commercial supply. Over 2 million tons a year!

Almonds arrived in California in the 1700's when Jesuit missionaries from Spain brought them as food and later planted them in their coastal missions. Eventually, settlers found that the nut grew much better in the inland areas of the state, away from the cool coastal fog.

California is the only place in North America where almonds are grown commercially. In the past 30 years, California's almond yield has quadrupled. More than 450,000 acres in the lush San Joaquin and Sacramento valleys are under almond cultivation, stretching 400 miles between Bakersfield and Red Bluff.

 Unmatched Nutrition: Almonds are the real deal when it comes to nutritional value. Rich in protein, fiber, calcium, antioxidant vitamin E, riboflavin, and niacin

Nuts and more importantly almonds are packed with vitamins, minerals and essential nutrients necessary to help reduce cravings and keep you energized all day. Unlike the traditional grain-based 'low-fat' snack, almonds are slow digesting which provides a more sustainable type of energy compared to the rush and crash carbohydrate based energy.



Almond hulls are solely used as a supplement feed for dairy cows at present. Almond shells can be ground up and used as bedding for garden planters and landscape material similar to wood chips. Nevertheless, almond shells are most commonly sold to co-generation plants to be used as a fuel source.

I live in Ripon California, the "Am-end Capital of the World", where we celebrated the 60th Almond Blossom Festival this past February with a golf tournament, big parade, brats and beans, fashion show, queen coronation, carnival, adorable Diaper Derby, and endless fun that awaited visitors to this grand event. Highway 99 splits Ripon in half and you may have stopped for fuel at Flying-J or Love truck stop on your way North and South.
