This is a beautiful facility nestled in the Sierra foothills. We had a great time and made many new friends. One downside was our failure to win a big jackpot in the casino to pay for our new motorhome. Imagine that. From there we made a short hop over to Red Bluff to visit some friends. They had planned an outdoor barbecue for us but wouldn't you know it, it started raining. They hadn't had rain for months; go figure. After our visit there we headed up to Winchester, Oregon, to visit friends we had not seen in 18 years. It was great seeing them and they, at 81 years old, are still active. Inverter/Charger



An inverter is the opposite of a converter, as it changes 12-volt-DC power to 120-volt-AC power. In other words, it takes an input of 12-volt-DC power from the battery bank and inverts it into 120-volt-AC power at the output. This

largely eliminates the need for shore or generator power, although large loads such as air conditioners can't effectively run off inverter power.

When an RV is connected to shore power or to a generator, an inverter/charger replaces a converter by running in reverse. It takes the 120-volt-AC power from the outside source and provides 12-volt-DC output that is used for battery charging and RV house power.

Commercial members Interesting facts of some of the 40 commercial members that joined FMCA in 1965.

Crown Coach Corporation, C1 (founded in 1904 - 1991); they manufactured fire engines, school buses and motorhomes, which they later marketed throughout the West Coast.

Blue Bird Body Company, C4, later becoming the Blue Bird Corporation. They remained a family business until the early 1990s. Their first motorhome was manufactured In 1963. Named the Blue Bird Transit Home (rebranded as Wanderlodge in 1968), it was a \$12,000 luxury recreational vehicle.

Wilsons Motor Caravan, C3, founded in 1904 as a driving school. This company is located in Brixton, England. Wilsons started the first global motorhome sales centre in 1958, and became the largest global



motorhome dealership throughout the 1960s and 1970s.

Most of the remaining vendors were made up of either car and truck dealers and other early manufactures of trailers and motorhomes.

Editor's Corner

Workamping / Camp Hosting

The term **workamping** was created and patented by Workamper News in 1987. Here is their definition of the term:

"Workcampers are adventuresome individuals, couples, and families who have chosen a wonderful lifestyle that combines any kind of part-time or full-time work with camping. If you work as an employee, operate a business, or donate your time as a volunteer, and you sleep in an RV, you are a workamper"

Camp hosting, park hosting, and workamping are all terms used to describe working while living in your RV. They all include any activity that involves the exchange of labor hours for anything of value. It could be a paycheck, or it could be a free hookup site. Usually, the term camp host is used for private campgrounds, and the term park host is used at national and state parks.



The California State Park system has 280 incredible state parks. Their miles of breathtaking coastline, remarkable wetlands, majestic redwood forests, beautiful deserts and colorful valleys provide a diversity of parks found nowhere else in the world.

Volunteer host positions are available in over 100 parks. This is a great opportunity to spend time in a wonderful location and meet fellow travelers. Hosts are typically located in a Park Hosts' campground location in a State Historic Park.

Host duties vary according to each park but generally include providing visitor information, staffing visitor centers and museums, maintenance projects and general housekeeping. Most hosts work approximately 20 hours a week and, in exchange for those services, the hosts are provided with a campsite during their stay.

Campground hosts serve as volunteers in the National Park Service's Volunteer-in-Parks (VIP) Program. Hosts assist park staff with campground operations and provide a variety of information to visitors including: campground and food storage

regulations; safety advisories concerning visitation while in bear and mountain lion country; backcountry camping, hiking, and fishing; National Park and concession facilities; interpretive programs; road conditions; park natural resources and other points of interest.

Hosts are often thought of as the "eyes and ears" of campgrounds. They provide supervisors and rangers with information regarding campground facilities, visitor use, wildlife sightings, and safety concerns, but do not take direct action involving law enforcement situations. Hosts may staff ranger stations; provide upkeep of campgrounds; and assist with the selection of campsites, camp registration, and fee payment. They do not accept or handle recreational fee transactions. The wearing of a VIP uniform identifies campground hosts. You may be reimbursed for the cost of required uniform clothing items.

Most campgrounds have full recreational vehicle hookups for hosts, but a few are more limited in utility services. Campground hosts live in designated sites within the campgrounds and are subject to visits and requests for assistance at all hours of the day. Hosts should plan on working in all kinds of weather due to the park's mountain environment. Due to training requirements, most campground host positions require a commitment of approximately three months. Campground seasons run from mid-May through mid-October, depending on the campground.
